OLD BUSINESS

*The Safety Committee is in the process of researching various methods of securing the building and increasing safety for members, staff, and tenants. *PCoC is in discussion with Gateway about expanding their presence.

*Thriving at Three's has requested dedicated nursery space; they will continue to share PCOC's nursery space.

*The Clerk's Annual Statistical Report was approved by the Session and submitted to the Presbytery.

NEW BUSINESS

*PCOC received a request to hold a vegan food market one Saturday a month in the Fellowship Hall. They've been offered the Mendenhall St. parking lot for this venture.

*The need for committee oversight of the WNFS has been referred to the Fellowship Committee.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Resource

*We are behind budgeted revenue for January, despite strong sales of parking passes, and have overspent budget in several areas due to unanticipated expenses.

Spiritual Formation

*We will seek a replacement for our nursery attendant, who has tendered her resignation.

Building and Grounds

*We are considering options to facilitate rental of building vacancies.

Personnel

*We are creating a new contract for future nursery attendants. Jane Cauthen, Pastoral Care Associate, made ten pastoral visits; other members made six visits.

Other Business

*Concern was raised about the committees with no members, especially the Outreach Committee. We discussed the surveys made, the requests for volunteers, which have seen little response in the last two years. We are seeking an outreach that the entire church can be involved in. Nancy Schaefer had information from the Presbytery website on Hunger Action; Mark is going to look into this.

"The Gift of Fading Away": A Talk by Bayo Akomolafe, Mar. 18

Our modern lives are built on the foundation of a truism: that we are the center of the world, and that nature around us is a mere backdrop for human activity. In recent imagination, nature has mounted an irresistible insurgency, shocking us by spilling through, by disturbing our calculations, by infiltrating our purity, and closing the presumed distance between us. In this talk about culture, losing faith, meeting loss, seeking home, and dealing with toxic futures, Bayo Akomolafe speaks about the cracks, openings and undoing of our former stories of certainty, and why we can make do with "dwelling in the meantime." The call to honor our entanglement with place and planet invites a strange but familiar vocation of recognizing we are fading away, and that this is ironically our deepest source of hope for justice.

Bayo Akomolafe (Ph.D.) is Chief Curator and Executive Director of The Emergence Network. He is author of *These Wilds Beyond our Fences: Letters to My Daughter on Humanity's Search for Home* and *We Will Tell Our Own Story*. Lecturer, speaker, father, and "rogue planet saved by the gravitational pull" of his wife ljeoma Clement Akomolafe, Bayo hopes to inspire a diffractive network of sharing within an ethos of new responsivity–a slowing down, an ethics of entanglement, an activism of inquiry, a 'politics of surprise'. Born into a Yoruba family, Bayo graduated summa cum laude in psychology in 2006 at Covenant University (Nigeria), and then was invited to take up a lecturing position. Largely nurtured and trained in a world that increasingly fell short of his deepest desires for justice, Bayo conducted doctoral research into Yoruba indigenous healing systems as part of his inner struggle to regain a sense of rootedness to his community. He has been speaking about his experiences around the world since those moments back in 2011.
